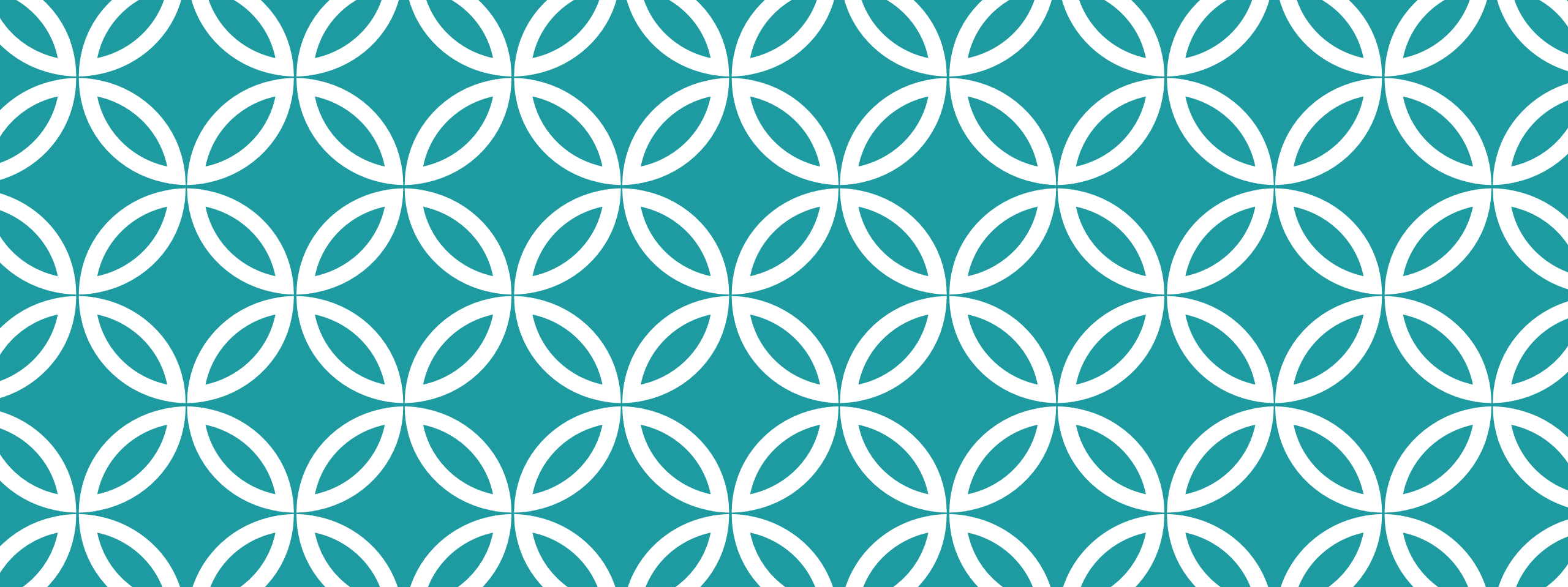


FWE INFUSION STRATEGY NOTES

STORIES

1. Build library of “church story” articles/chapters; that is, of local churches that have equipped congregants for Monday-Saturday mission and community-service type activities
 - A. [Made To Flourish](#)’s city network leaders & their *Common Good* magazine and web content, available when you join MTF;
 - B. Luke Bobo and Skye Jethani’s short book *Discipleship with Monday in Mind* (second, improved edition now available from MTF)
 - C. Christian media – e.g. CT *Our Cities* series; [Christian History](#) issues on healthcare, science, vocation, new industrial economy, etc.
2. Build library of story-based video resources appropriate for use in classroom settings (e.g. [Faith & Co.](#), [Economic Wisdom Project](#) talks, [American Enterprise Institute](#) videos, Acton [For the Life of the World](#) short video series, [Faith & Work Summit](#) videos)
3. Source stories of APDP FWE successes from fellow schools in the APDP network
4. Bring FWE-integrating alumni and local leaders (e.g. in business, non-profits, etc.) to speak

VIDEO SERIES

1. **Faith & Co.**: a series of vivid, personal documentary short films on the struggles and triumphs of people living out business as their calling. The first two seasons address “Business on Purpose” and “Serving Employees.” At 5-10 minutes each, these are usable in a classroom setting. Associated Seattle Pacific University courses may be taken either free or at \$399 for three credits.
2. **ReFrame**: <https://www.reframecourse.com/>, an extended, deep examination of how we may “reframe” our life and work for missional impact in a post-Christian world. Of the 10-video series, see especially episodes **8: “Strangers and Exiles”** and **9: “Ambassadors”**; episodes are 35-40 minutes long, but the depth makes them worth assigning (inside or outside of class) in appropriate courses.
3. **The Good Society**: a series of free, short, sharable films exploring the economic, moral, political, social, and theological foundations of a flourishing society. Study guides are available for purchase for classroom or small-group use.
4. **For the Life of the World**: A seven-part series called by CT Executive Editor Andy Crouch “The best treatment of faith and culture ever put on a screen.”
